ELECTION TRENDS

Results are based on telephone interviews conducted October 27-28, 2012, on the Gallup Daily election tracking survey, with a random sample of -1,063-- adults, aged 18+, living in all 50 U.S. states and the District of Columbia.

For results based on the total sample of national adults, one can say with 95% confidence that the margin of error is ± 4 percentage points.

For results based on the total sample of -961—registered voters, one can say with 95% confidence that the margin of error is ± 4 percentage points.
